Key Stage 3

All students at Key Stage 3 study English, maths, science, geography, history, a language and PE. They also study creative subjects such as art, music, drama and food.



Key Stage 4

In years 10 and 11, we offer a wide range of courses alongside our core curriculum of English, maths, science, RE and PE.

LITERACY AND Reading



Literacy and effective communication underpin the entire curriculum at Whalley Range 11-18 High School. Students develop their reading ability in all subject areas and across school, as well as being encouraged and supported in their reading for pleasure.



Students and staff alike appreciate the fundamental role that strong communication skills will have on a student's chance of success: not only will effective communication support the development of reading in all subject areas, but it will also prepare students effectively for life beyond school.

As soon as your daughter starts at Whalley Range 11-18 High School, she will be taught by teachers who understand the difference between the learning to read model at primary school and the disciplinary literacy needed for different subject areas at secondary school. Your daughter will start learning how her reading and communication changes depending on the lesson that she is in, while also continuing on her reading for pleasure journey.

As part of her reading entitlement, your daughter will be provided with four books that she can read independently, for pleasure, in years 7 and 8, and three books in year 9.

As well as the opportunity to read and engage with these texts in English lessons, your daughter will also have an hour each week where she can take the time to read and enjoy her book in a different subject area. As your daughter reaches GCSE and Post-16 study, this reading entitlement becomes more academic in its focus.

In addition to the fantastic reading opportunities provided in lessons, all students also have the chance to engage with literacy and reading beyond the curriculum, including access to our state-of-the-art Learning Resource Centre. The LRC is fully stocked with a range of literature and is constantly being updated with student and staff recommendations. All students can also take part in countless reading competitions and activities, all designed to help students engage with reading and see its benefits. Whalley Range 11-18 High School understands the importance of reading and is committed to improving the reading and literacy of every student in school.

INCLUSION

The Inclusion Faculty supports all students who have Special Educational Needs and Disabilities and those new to English, to make sure that they are successful in school.

We support all students with additional needs. We have a very experienced team of teaching assistants and teachers who support students with a wide range of needs. Through carefully planned transition with primary schools, we make sure that we are able to support students when they join our school to ensure that they become independent in their learning and in their social interactions.

Students can receive support in lessons to help them access the curriculum. In addition to this there are tailored interventions to focus on skills that students may need support with such as literacy, numeracy, communication and many others.

If your daughter is new to English, we have an experienced team of staff who are able to help to ensure that she is well settled in school.

We welcome all students and provide nurturing support for every child that attends our school.

It helps them to stay safe, healthy and to be prepared for life's challenges and opportunities in modern Britain.



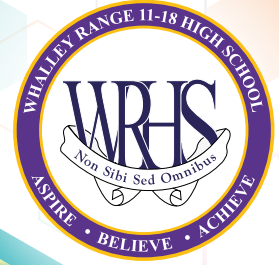
EXTRA CURRICULAR Opportunities

ORGANISATION –

Year Groups and Houses

Every student at Whalley Range 11-18 High School is placed into a form group with a Learning Coach. There are ten forms in each year group.

Form groups are also organised into the school's five House Teams of Angelou, Franklin, Germain, Hepburn and Parks. Each House is named after an inspirational female role model. These House Teams help to contribute to a sense of belonging and community, as well as allowing for some healthy competition.

Learning Coaches are the first point of contact for students and families. Each Learning Coach is pivotal to a student's success: monitoring, guiding and supporting in both academic and pastoral areas.

Learning Coaches will also signpost students towards opportunities both inside and outside school which will help to support students' personal development.

PRIDE IN Our Uniform

Our students take great pride in their appearance.
All students should...

- Wear a school blazer at all times, including breaks and lunchtimes.
- Wear a white shirt.
- Wear their year group lanyard and tie.
- Wear their school swipe card at all times and be prepared to show it to any member of staff on request.
- Wear black trousers or a skirt of school uniform style. Leggings, jeans-type leggings and jogging type trousers are not permitted. Skirts must be of an appropriate length (maximum 2" above the knee and 4" below the knee).
- Wear a school jumper (optional) with logo.
- Wear flat, black shoes or all-black trainers. Boots to the ankle (Kicker style) may be worn.
- Wear a plain, black headscarf (if one is worn); no tassels, sequins or embroidery (only one headscarf to be worn).
- Wear black or purple hair bands or bobbles or slides.
- Wear school issued badges only.

- Not wear any jewellery, except a watch.
- Not wear make-up, nail polish or acrylic nails of any kind.
- Not wear piercings or retainers.
- Not wear hair that is of an extreme style.
